

Stores act to curb shoplifting

Greater publicity of shoplifting convictions is needed to curb mounting thefts from retail stores, John K. Menzies, superintendent of E. W. Edwards and Son, said yesterday.

Speaking at meeting of the Greater Syracuse Chamber of Commerce Store Security Committee, Menzies said publication of names of shoplifting offenders acts as a deterrent to future theft.

He also called for printing of names "on all cases," including adults and juvenile offenders.

Attending the meeting were Sheriff Patrick J. Corbett, Asst. Dist. Atty. Patrick Cunningham, Lt. Edward J. Corbett of the Syracuse Police Department, and representatives of 11 major stores in the Syracuse area.

A subcommittee was appointed to study establishment of a central registry, which would inform merchants of persons recently convicted of shoplifting.

Scheduled for Oct. 19 is a workshop for all retail stores on techniques for prevention of shoplifting, Walter J. Fox, director of the Chamber's Retail Trade Bureau, announced.

Fox also announced a pilot course in economics for local businessmen. The discussion courses are tentatively slated for Oct. 8, when John C. Bailey, district manager of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, will address the 20 delegates.

David Jones Durhamville

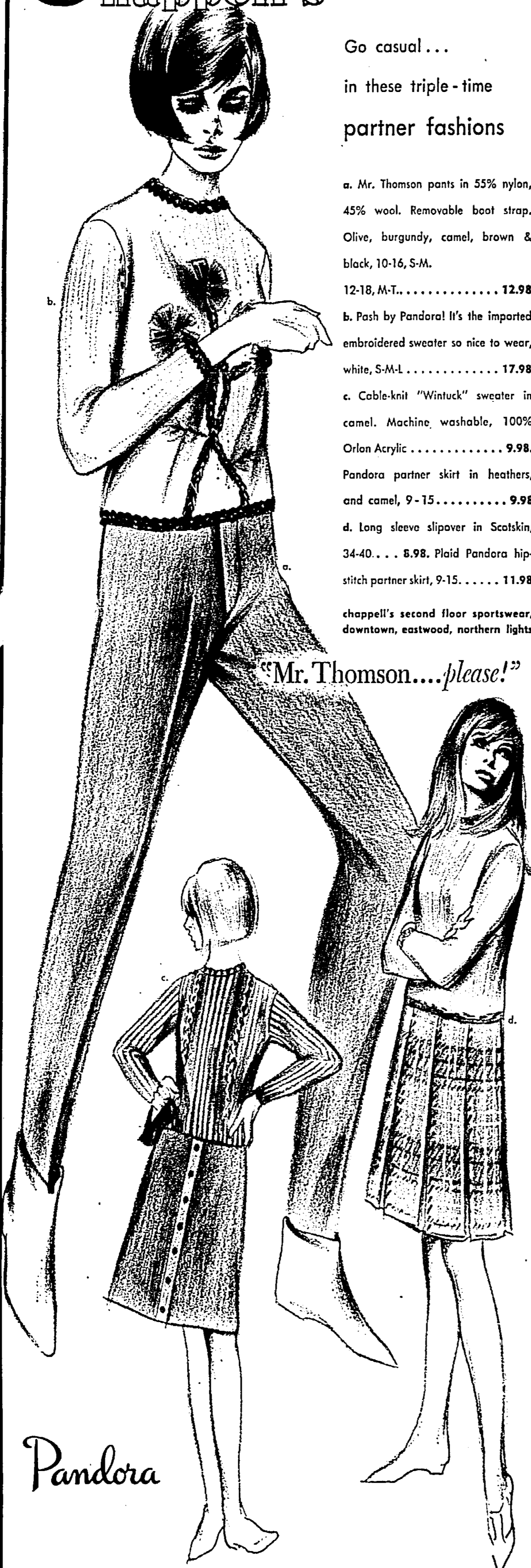
DURHAMVILLE — David C. Jones, 67, of Fox St., died yesterday at the Veterans Administration Hospital, Syracuse.

Friends may call at the funeral home today from 7 to 9 p.m. and tomorrow from 2 to 4 and 7 to 9 p.m.

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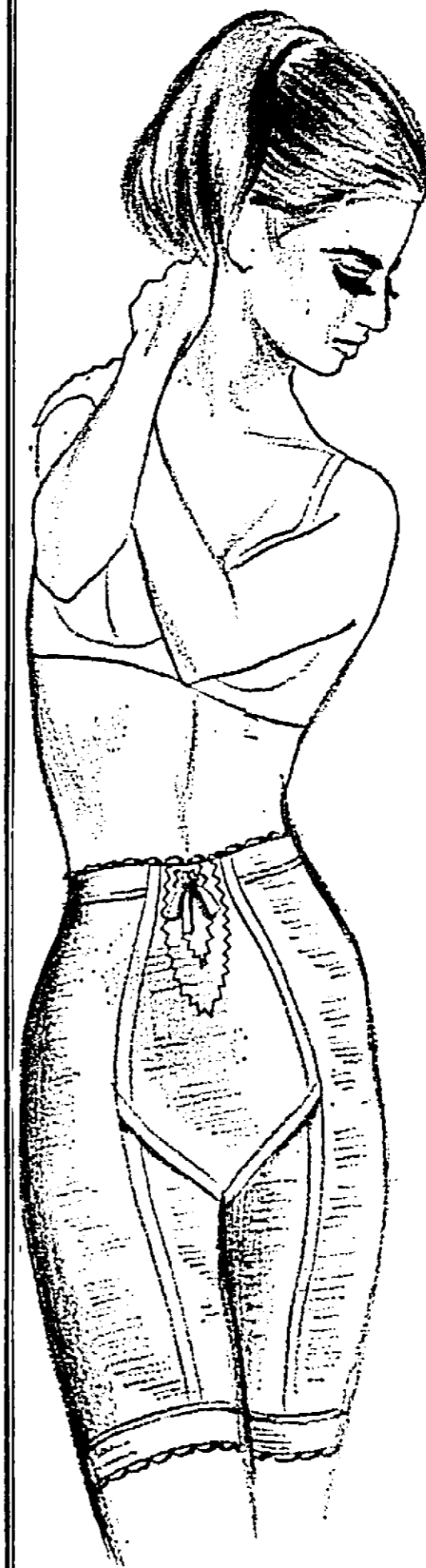
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
